Dan Dolan has served as President of the New England Power Generators Association (NEPGA) since the fall of 2011. NEPGA is the trade association representing 80% of the installed generation capacity in New England, approximately 25,000 megawatts. As President he is the principal spokesperson and oversees all activities for the largest trade association representing competitive electric generating companies in New England. Dolan leads a staff that represents the membership on electricity market rules development and expansion of wholesale electric competition and is a frequent speaker at legislative and regulatory hearings as well as industry conferences. He was appointed to the Commission on the Future of Transportation in the Commonwealth by Massachusetts Gov. Charlie Baker to advise the Governor on transportation needs and challenges out to the year 2040.

Dolan had previously worked at the Electric Power Supply Association (EPSA), the national trade association representing competitive power suppliers, including generators and marketers. He departed as Vice President of Policy Research & Communications where he was responsible for coordinating research, reports, studies and analysis as well as directing communications and state advocacy for the organization. Dolan also oversaw the development of energy trading policy including spearheading EPSA's activities in the development and implementation of the Dodd-Frank Wall St. Reform Act.

Dolan holds a bachelor's degree in business management with a concentration in international business from Goucher College. He remains active in Goucher College's Alumni Association. Dolan is currently a member of the Board of Directors of Family ACCESS, a center for comprehensive education and support services for over 100 years, which empowers and strengthens families through a set of integrated programs focused on literacy, consulting and child assault prevention. Gilbert E. Metcalf is the John DiBiaggio Professor of Citizenship and Public Service and Professor of Economics at Tufts University. In addition, he is a Research Associate at the National Bureau of Economic Research and a University Fellow at Resources For The Future. Metcalf's primary research area is applied public finance with particular interests in taxation, energy, and environmental economics. His current research focuses on policy evaluation and design in the area of energy and climate change. His most recent book, *Paying for Pollution: Why a Carbon Tax is Good for America* will be published by Oxford University Press this December.

Metcalf has frequently testified before Congress, served on expert panels for the National Academies of Sciences and the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, and served as a consultant to numerous other organizations. During 2011 and 2012, he served as the Deputy Assistant Secretary for Environment and Energy at the U.S. Department of Treasury where he was the founding U.S. Board Member for the UN based Green Climate Fund. He has published extensively in academic journals and books on various topics including energy and tax policy. Metcalf received a B.A. in Mathematics from Amherst College, an M.S. in Agricultural and Resource Economics from the University of Massachusetts Amherst, and a Ph.D. in Economics from Harvard University.

She has written extensively about environmental taxation, including carbon taxes. Recent publications include J. Milne, ed., *Environmental Taxation and the Law* (Edward Elgar 2017) and J. Milne and M.S. Andersen, eds., *Handbook of Research on Environmental Taxation* (Edward Elgar 2012).
